Distinguished Speakers, Colleagues, Ladies and Gentlemen,

A very good morning to everyone and thank you for joining us at the 3rd International Conference Mediterráneos 2016, an initiative that emerged in 2010 among early-stage researchers and the Institute of Languages and Cultures of the Mediterranean and the Near East of the Centre for Humanities and Social Sciences of the Spanish National Research Council.

Although the sessions are programmed to end each day at around 5 o'clock, the Congress itself will not end but we suggest to continue exchanging our experiences and visions about our professional future hanging out together in the centre of Madrid. We hope that this Congress will also serve to compare and contrast professional careers in different academic institutions, as it has been conceived as an opportunity for the creation of networks that in the future we hope will remain when all of us will have already advanced in our research career and hopefully got full-time jobs.

We would also like to draw your attention to a guided visit that the Committee has organized with the collaboration of Pilar Martínez Olmo, director of the Library Tomás Navarro Tomás that will take place today at 1 o'clock. You may find of special interest a small exhibit of manuscripts and rare codices that the library has kindly prepared for us on the first floor.

We would also like to inform you that the Organizing Committee will make a preliminary selection of papers for a future publication if we are successful to obtain the necessary funding. Without discarding other publication possibilities, our Congress has already received an offer from Cambridge Scholars Publishing, an independent academic publishing house, with more than 5,000 titles with a particular focus on the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

First and foremost, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to Dr. M^a Ángeles Gallego, director of the Institute of Languages and Cultures of the Mediterranean and the Near East, for her promotion and guidance in the process of organizing this international conference. As the director of our institute, she has always given us support with the courtesy and kindness that define her. The same applies to all the members of the Institute of Languages and Cultures of the Mediterranean and the Near East, who have kindly collaborated with us throughout this process. This initiative would have not been possible without their contribution in their different areas of expertise.

We feel deeply grateful to Dr. Luis Alburquerque, director of the Centre for Humanities and Social Sciences, for the assistance of all the administrative and technical units. Among them we would like to highlight the unit of scientific, cultural and digital dissemination, especially Victor Pareja, head of the unit.
